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Musical-dance Occasions at Constantinople During the Late-Byzantine Period (1025-1453)

Abstract

During the years of Byzantine Empire, the official position of the State and the Church, in relation to dance and music, was negative. Although a first approach to the subject, offers an isolation impression of the musical-dance phenomenon in a theocratic socio-political system, a closer analysis reveals that dance and music possessed a leading role not only at the social but also the religious way of living for the habitants of Byzantine Empire. During the period investigated at the present study (1025-1453), known as late-Byzantine, Greek civilization, education and language had conquered the capital city of Byzantine Empire as well as the major cities of Balkans and East.
